



Much has been written about both the Biblical illiteracy of teenage believers and the flight of young people from the Church. Many have observed this trend, and I too have witnessed it anecdotally as a youth pastor (and shamefully, I contributed to the trend for some time before I changed course). Some writers and Christian observers deny the flight of young people



altogether, but the growing statistics should alarm us enough as Church leaders to do something about the dilemma. My hope in this post is to simply consolidate some of the research (many of the summaries are directly quoted) so you can decide for yourself. I'm going to organize the recent findings in a way that illuminates the problem:



CIRP Freshman Survey (2017) of student AT 184 US College and Universuty

(CIRP Freshman Survey – was located @ Higher Education Research Institute (HERI) at UCLA)

Findings:


1)College freshman are religiously unaffiliated:

 $(1986) 10\% \rightarrow (2017) 31\%$ (increase 3x)

2)This survey was done BEFORE the student arrived on campus. So student losing interest in religion not necessary caused by college education.





Most comprehensive research of 13-18 YO Gen-Z about religion.



<u>Findings from these 2 studies - Reasons of kids</u> <u>dropping out from Christianity:</u>

- Some Gen Z turned atheists/ irreligious, even they had attended church at some points
- 2. Cannot believe a good God would allow so much evil/ suffering/injustice in the world
- 3. Church's teaching is vague or shallow
- 4. Church does not take Bible seriously




- 5. Religion is irrelevant for my life
- 6. Church is out of date
- 7. Church is overprotective of teenagers
- 8. Christians are hypocrites
- 9. Had a bad experience at church with a Christian, or I don't like the people there




In this 35 year study of families, key findings:

1. PARENTS IS THE "SINGLE GREATEST INFLUENCE" on their children's faith.

2. SEEING PARENT'S FAITH ACTUALLY MAKES A DIFFERENCE IN THEIR OWN LIVES

they're much more likely to follow parent's steps to follow God.

- ➤ Q: how we show Jesus really made a difference in \$ / time we spend (Value)
- ➤ Q: How we show we are walking in faith?



3. CLOSE RELATIONSHIP WITH THEIR PARENTS -

Then young adults are more likely to share their parents' religious beliefs and participation

Q: How strong is your relationship with the kids

Q: How you communicate? with the kids?






4. PARENTS HAVE BEEN PATIENT & SUPPORTIVE


These young Christians who leave the faith are far more likely to return to God. Parents are more tolerant and open than they had been before the prodigal's departure.

They surveyed:

2,000 churchgoersparents (at least once 1x/ month)

Age: Parents who have adult children ages 18 to 30 who are still believers.



Predictors of Spiritual Health for Young Adults:

Child	Parents involve in these
Regularly read the Bible	Read the Bible several times a week.
Regularly pray	Teaching the kids to tithe
Regularly served in church	Served in church + tell own teen to serve
Listened mainly to Christian music	Church emphasized on what Bible says
Joined mission trip	Join mission trip as a "family" (see pix)
	Asking for forgiveness when made mistake
	Encourage kids to develop own talent/interest
	Take annual family vacation







Speaker's few observation:

1)Ministry considerationApologetic focus teaching –Apologia in Greek = Defense





2) Keep a consistent church community –

(Kids friendship and trust last for the next

20-40 years)





3. Relevancy of Christian Faith to Their Daily Life

Keep abreast of current affairs, trends, internet ad social issues – coaching the kids how to apply Biblical principles to tough situation. Engagement + teachable moment.





4. Link your teens to older brothers/ sisters in the church.

(Youth workers, college age mentor, discipleship etc)






5. Open your house for the Lord

Your kids will have a safe and cozy place to build Christian communities, hang-out, cell groups etc.






